Course description:

This course is offered for students with a basic knowledge of Italian language and provides practice in understanding (listening and reading), speaking and writing. It is structured on the skills listed in the Common European Framework of Languages for level A2 (waystage). The first part of the course aims to create a homogeneous starting point for learners who may have neglected their Italian for few semesters. Wide use of listening tracks and authentic reading materials helps the learner improve his/her skills while getting closer to Italian culture.

Aims:

By the end of the semester, in the three major categories of language use (i.e. "understanding", "speaking", "writing"), the students are expected to:

- Understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to areas of most immediate relevance;
- Communicate in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters;
- Describe in simple terms aspects of their background, immediate environment, and matters in area of immediate need;
- Share or challenge an opinion about matters related to areas of most immediate relevance.



Teaching Method:

- Class lectures.
- Lab classes (depending on the number of students in each section).
- Audio and video tracks.
- Individual tutoring: the instructor receives the students to discuss specific issues related to the course, to provide information about the possibility to learn Italian in Jordan or in Italy, in addition to information about university study in Italy in general. By the end of the course the student is expected to be able to:

Knowledge & Understanding:

- a. Comprehend phrases, dialogues and the highest frequency vocabulary related to areas of most immediate personal relevance (personal information, themselves and other people physical description, shopping, booking, place description, work/study and leisure time, past experiences and future plans).
- b. Produce clear language in simple and routine tasks, requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar topics and activities.
- c. Handle very short social exchanges, with the help of the interlocutor/s.
- d. Catch the main point in short, clear, simple messages and announcements
- e. Write short simple notes and messages relating to matters in areas of immediate needs. Write simple, personal letters/emails, posts and paragraphs, for example



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- thanking someone for something, introducing themselves and their family, filling forms (applications, CV, etc.)
- **f.** Read and comprehend non literary texts that deal with known topics, personal letters/emails, advertisements, prospectuses, menus and timetables.

Cognitive Skills (thinking and analysis):

- a. Become aware of cultural differences in daily situations, so to be able to use the suitable language for the right behaviour.
- b. Infer the signification of new words.

Communication skills:

- a. Work individually as well as with other classmates in solving reading and listening comprehension exercises and writing dialogues.
- b. Compose a dialogue or written text following a given pattern.
- c. Write invitation cards and short messages to make an appointment and to give road directions.

Practical and Subject Specific Skills (Transferable Skills):

- a. Introduce himself orally and in writing (background, living conditions, family, studies, hobbies, employment, hopes);
- b. Report events in chronological order;
- c. Inquire about information and ask for assistance in daily life situations;
- d. Choose a suitable place to spend time in with friends (*enoteca*, *agriturismo*, *ristorante tipico*, *discoteca*, *circolo*...).
- e. Choose food or refreshments from an Italian food and drinks menu.
- f. Orienting oneself on a map.

Expected workload:

On average students are expected to review the contents of the last 50 minutes lesson they took for at least 15 minutes daily, to refresh and try to memorize vocabulary and expressions. When homework is required, students are supposed to have it done in 10 to 30 minutes.

Attendance Policy:

Students who exceed the 15% limit without a medical or emergency excuse acceptable to and approved by the Director of the Language Centre shall not be allowed to take the final examination and shall receive a mark of **zero** for the course.
