Module Description:

This course deals with the legal principles of the Jordanian civil code relating to enforcing obligation, its attributes, its transfer and its termination, by means of defining obligation and its types, and the effect of obligation insofar as elucidating the types of execution, conditions and procedures, and the legitimate means for safeguarding execution emanating from the notion of public security and the indirect lawsuit, the formal lawsuit, and the lawsuit relating to the invalidity of the conduct of the debtor and the right to limit someone's legal competence and detention of the bankrupt debtor, in addition to elucidating the characteristics of obligation, which is contingent on a condition and added to a term, and the multiplicity of the parties of obligation, the solidarity between the debtors, and solidarity between the creditors, the multiplicity of the substance of obligation, and the causes of the termination of obligation. This is an analytical theoretical study of the legal rules, which is buttressed by judicial applications.

Module Aims: This module aims to:

1. provide students with the basis as well as advanced knowledge for the principles and concepts related to the effects of obligation in Jordanian legislation
2. enhance students cognitive and practical skills in the effects of obligation as well as their abilities to learn and enhance their abilities to solve problems and apply theoretical knowledge to actual cases
3. develop and enhance students abilities to write theoretical as well as practical legal research papers in this area and to receive adequate training in using the sources of learning and information technology
4. enable students to enhance their written as well as oral skills and to further encourage them to work effectively both independently as well as with a group
