Module Description

This course includes an introduction to the environment and its elements, pollution, protecting the environment from pollution, introducing the public institutions for the protection of the environment, their composition, specialization, administrative control and the protection of the environment, administrative control institutions, the elements of the general environmental regime, public security, public health, public tranquility, morals and ethics, administrative control particular to the environment, Islamic law and the environment, liability for harming the environment, the manner of determining environmental damages, the protection of the law of the elements of the environment, combating pollution as a result of radiation and noise pollution.

Module Aims: this course aims at the following

1. Provide students with basic as well as advanced knowledge in the legislations and laws related to environmental protection and development.
2. develop students cognitive skills in discussions related to the environment as well as practical skills in recognizing specific procedures related to environmental protection from the legal aspects
3. develop and enhance students skills in writing and preparing legal research papers as well as environment related articles.
