#### **Module Description:**

This course deals with the origins of copyrights, their nature and basis in law, and an elucidation of the elements of the author's rights through an overview of the characteristics of literary rights and financial rights, coupled with the content of each of these, in addition to referring to the means of protection designated for the right of the author.. the conditions and types of protection, and the texts included in the protection in accordance with national legislation (Copyright law no. 22 for the year 1992, which was amended, and the audiovisual media law and the regulation for depositing books), international and regional conventions (the Berne convention, the Arab copyright law, the convention of the aspects related to trade in copyrights TRIPS, the convention for protection performance artists and producers of voice recordings and broadcasting stations, the convention for protection of the producers of voice recordings, the convention for the distribution of signals (transmission) that are carriers of the programs in terms of industrial aspects, (the Brussels convention and the world organization for copyright convention for performance and recordings), while showing the forms of encroachments on copyrights and performance rights, and the penalties devolving upon these- a theoretical and comparative study supported by the most important judicial applications.

Module Aims: This module aims to:

- 1. provide students with the basic as well as advanced knowledge in the Jordanian copyrights law, its features, sources and historical development
- 2. develop students cognitive skills in analyzing and discussing legal texts relevant to Copyrights and Neighboring Rights, in addition to their practical skills in being able to apply theoretical knowledge actual practical cases
- **3.** prepare students to receive legal technical training in the field of copyrights, in addition to enable them to perform the job and legal services in compliance with the demand of the job market
- 4. enhance students skills in writing theoretic and practical legal research papers regarding Copyrights, and to further utilize the various sources of knowledge and to marshal and benefit from data and information
- 5. enable students to enhance their written and oral skills, and to further encourage them to work effectively both in a single and team spirit, and to benefit from modern techniques
