Module Description:

The international organizations module deals with the principal ideas calling for the establishment of an international organization in the West and the Arab world, and the efforts exerted on the international level to achieve this aim. There is a focus on studying the general principles for the international organization, and a definition and classification of the international organization, and the jurisdictions, powers and sources of international organizations, and the methods of issuing resolutions, and the legal status of international organizations, with an expanded study of the League of Nations, the United Nations and certain regional organizations, particularly, the Arab League..etc.

Module Aims: This module aims to:

- 1. provide students with the basic as well as advanced knowledge related to the International Organizations, its sources, development and the various activities of the International Community
- 2. Develop students cognitive as well as practical skills in dealing with the various topics related to international organizations, in addition to develop their ability to learn and benefit from sources of knowledge
- 3. develop students skills in writing research papers, essays and reports related to the International organizations field
- 4. graduate students who are able to play a positive and effective role in the International community as well as international organizations
