Module Description

This course deals with the general rules relating to crimes committed against state security in terms of defining the concept of political conspiracy, hostile attack, notification and incitement- and the judicial competence regarding these crimes, moreover, crimes against the external and internal security of the state are addressed.

Module Aims: the aims of this module is to:

- 1. provide students with the basic and advanced knowledge of the legislations related to state national security and crimes which are considered threatening state national security
- 2. provide students with cognitive and scientific skills related to issues of state security crimes and its judicial applications
- 3. develop students skills in writing and preparing articles, reports and research papers related to crimes against state security
